"Both Elinor and I are feeling fine and are really enjoying this Texas winter. The coldest it has ever gotten here is a cool 34 degrees. Quite a difference from the Kansas winter.

"For a little history of the Naval station here, it is called the 'Home of Naval Jet Training:' It was reactivated in April 1951 and since then four squadrons have moved here.

"My unit HTU-400 was the first to arrive. It is a squadron of TBM's torpedo bombers. They were followed by ATU-100, an F8F squadron, and ATU-102, an F6F squadron. The jets on ATU-200 were last but it is for them that the base is best known as it is the only advanced naval jet training base.

"We are aviation training units for the training of naval cadets. It is the last training they get before attempting carrier operations and it takes a pilot about 12 weeks to complete training here.

"I hope this finds you feeling fine and in the best of health. We sure like your paper and it keeps us in touch with home and home town folks."
