



MEMORIES OF FAMILY EVENTS

My memory of my father is very dim and sketchy. One thing I do remember is the haircuts which he gave to us and our cousins on Sunday afternoons. It was also a chance to get together and play ball or other games.

Some of the memories from growing up on the farm bring back many pleasant activities. Keith, with a little help from me, made a giant bean shooter out of a large fork of a tree we had trimmed. We used inner tubes and created a weapon that would shoot egg size rock at the cattle 200 yards away and make them jump when the rock hit the ground nearby. The weapon was attached to a metal post driven in the ground and took both of us to pull it back. Great fun was also had by flying coffee can lids which behaved much like Frisbees except you didn't want to catch them with their sharp edges. Had we known the potential we could be millionaires!! We tried to set off 50 caliber machine gun shells by putting them in an outdoor vise and shooting them with a 22 until we were told what would actually happen had we been successful. It would not have been pretty!!

We used to play hide and seek in the cane field north of the house. Keith and Dean would hide in the field and while I tried to find them, they would sneak out of the field and go to the house for a peanut butter snack. After a while, I would give up or they would come back to get me.

Watching storms arrive is another good memory. As the cool air from the storm approached we would huddle on the warmed cement steps wrapped in a blanket, squint through the dust clouds at the storm until the rain finally drove us inside. Our family still enjoys watching clouds and storm, admiring God's beauty and fury. As children we would stand in the barn doorway looking for the largest hailstone or watch the draws and rivers rise after a storm. Many of these events are very vivid to me.

The streams in our area, the Smokey Hill, Salt Creek, Plum Creek and the draw in our pasture each created indelible memories. The big floods on the Smokey Hill River, when the water rose to the bottom of the bridge on Hwy 23 and huge trees floating under the bridge struck the foundation of the bridge with a loud vibrating thud, was pure excitement to children.

When a call came that Plum Creek has received 5 or 6 inches of rain in its upper reaches and was expected to rise dramatically, the family drove north on Hwy 23 to the bridge. An incredible wall of water created by vegetation, trees and trash came flowing down the creek in a slow steady pace wiping out everything in its way. When it hit the fence, the wires strained and stretched and finally, with a snarl gave way and the trash surged on into the bridge. The bridge was temporarily blocked and the water rose and eventually ran over the road on both sides of the bridge creating a logistical challenge for those spectators on the bridge. The adults quickly removed us from the bridge to safety. Another fascinating thing about the floods was the wild life which would be caught in these trash flows. Rabbits, mice, rats, snakes, turtles were all searching for a place to escape. When I was older these creatures provided good target practice as the stream raced by.

The dam we built on Salt Creek was used for irrigation, fishing, swimming and duck hunting. After many years of use, floodwater washed out the spillways of the dam and eventually it was destroyed. The draw in the pasture provided a small but magical stream after rains with pools, waterfalls and rapids that were fascinating to us as young children. This pasture is located directly east of the Wilson home place where Dean and Gaye lived for many years.

When I was in lower elementary, Dean, Keith and I had daily chores - milking cows, feeding pigs, cattle and chickens. Chores were routine and passed without incident until dips in the cow tank became necessary to clean up after a manure fight. The fun consisted of finding a dry cow patty and scooping up fresh droppings and throwing it at a brother. All stinky good fun for boys.

We also liked to try to ride steers in the winter when the cattle were lined up at the feed bunks. We approached from the rear, leaping onto an unsuspecting critter that would back out of line and toss us quickly into the barnyard slop. Or we would grab a calf by the tail and see how long we could hang on. It was great fun as they ran across the corral until they made a sharp turn near a fence propelling us into the fence and ultimately into the muck. This went well until our Dad caught us having great fun running pounds off the cattle we were trying to fatten. That ended that.

Gathering eggs was my job for quite a few years. The old setting hens didn't appreciate me reaching under them to get eggs so they would peck my hands and arms. One day I reached into a nest high above my head and grabbed a very large bull snake. I was terrified but not bitten. I grabbed the hoe to kill the intruder but my Dad said "No, it's a good snake" and was later moved to the barn for mouse control. The snake had 3 chicken eggs in it. My Dad and I watched the snake come down and wrap around a post in the chicken house. The constriction of snake's muscles broke the eggs one by one. Another lesson learned.

Our biggest challenge as youth was to try to beat Mother at Croquet. To this day when I play Croquet I remember our court with fruit trees in it and trying different strategies to win a game against Mother. She would go first and beat us so we went first the next time figuring that was the secret and she would beat us again. We played thousands of games of Croquet, seldom were we able to win if she was playing. As I began making a list of family events in which we participated, the list became too large to cover in this writing. I know that all the kittens, cards games, ball games, livestock, gardens, chores and many other things shared with my brothers, sisters and parents shaped my life and everything that I may accomplish or enjoy.

After attending elementary school at Jerome, I attended high school in Dighton, KS and lived with my sister, Delila Speer, and her family in town. I graduated from Dighton School in 1955.

Upon graduating from Dighton High School I enrolled at Fort Hays State in Hays, KS. I majored in mathematics and completed in track as a javelin thrower. After achieving some success as a freshman I received a track scholarship for the next three years. During my junior and senior year I placed 3rd and 2nd in the National Championships. After graduating from Fort Hays State majoring in mathematics in 1960 and my marriage to Margaret Macy, I began my professional life by signing a contract to teach at Isabel High School, Isabel, KS in Barber County as math teacher and coach. I coached baseball, then basketball in winter and track in the spring. We won 4 consecutive league championships in baseball and track. Basketball was not as successful, winning only three games the first year and seven the second year. I did not coach basketball again, but continued coaching track for the next 5 years as head and assistant coach.

Isabel was a wonderful place to start my career and family. The community was caring, helpful and supportive in many ways. Both our children were born while we lived there. Kevin was born in the summer of 1961 when we lived with my mother, Consuella York. I worked for the York's with their farm operation during the summer. Lisa was born in Pratt, KS during the 1963 school year. Neighbors and good friends helped us with the children and supported us for those four years.

In 1964 the superintendent of Marion, KS called and asked me to apply for the math and track position at Marion High School. After an interview and much thought I accepted the position. I taught mathematics and coached track and cross country for 35 years. I was also a mathematics teacher for Butler College in Marion at their satellite campus in town. I retired from Marion High School in 1999, but have continued to coach as an assistant in track.

Our first home in Marion on West Santa Fe Street was a very humble dwelling for which we were very thankful. With frozen pipes, plugged sewer and flood threats it was a challenging time for our family. We are still living in Marion, 52 years later having moved from Santa Fe Street to Roosevelt Street and now live on Elm Street.


Dighton and Scott finished even in the number of first places, each having four, but Scott out-weighed


