

# Memories of Grace Marie Wilson

My mother, Grace Marie Wilson, was born July 13, 1890 in Norton, Kansas. She married my father, Lewis Nelson Hughes on April 11, 1910 in Cherokee, Oklahoma.

They made their home on a farm near Waldron, Kansas. There were nine children born to their family - three boys and six girls. Harry E. Hughes was the first born and died as an infant. Dale Kenneth Hughes was born November 24, 1911. He married Glennys Veatch, October 24, 1936. They adopted two children, Virginia LuAnn Hughes born November 7, 1952 and Dennis Lynn Hughes born March 2, 1954. Dale died March 15, 1992.

Dean Wesley Hughes was born November 30, 1913. He married Vivian Bonita Campbell February 21, 1937. Their children are Bonnie Jean Hughes born February 9, 1943, Sherri DeAnn Hughes born September 4, 1946, Vickie Lou Hughes born January 7, 1950, Dean Wesley Hughes born October 12, 1953 and Rodney Jackson Hughes born December 20, 1960.

Geneva Olive Hughes was born October 29, 1916. She married Morris Ervin Redfern August 4, 1935. They have three children. Charles Morris Redfern was born June 8, 1936, Carolyn Ann Redfern was born January 17, 1938 and Sharyl Sue Redfern born July 31, 1943. Ruth Freida Hughes was the next child born to Grace and Lewis Hughes but I have no other information.

Gladys Irene Hughes was born June 29, 1922. She married Floyd J. Hobbs March 14, 1962. Their children are Jyl Allyson Hobbs born March 26, 1963 and Becky Eileen Hobbs born June 2, 1964. There are also six step-children. They are Daryl Floyd Hobbs, Lynn Jay Hobbs, Allyn Frank Hobbs, Lyle Dexter Hobbs, Byron Kent Hobbs and Vicky Glee Hobbs.

Glennys Fern Hughes was born Mary 22, 1924. She died March 24, 1940 of rheumatic fever.

Lulu Nadine Hughes was born December 24, 1926. She married Duane A. Hunt December 26, 1948. Their children are Dalton Lewis Hunt born March 25, 1950, Deborah LuAnn Hunt born March 18,1952, Jyl Janell Hunt born June 8, 1954 and Cynthia Meg Hunt born March 4, 1957.

Berniece Maxine Hughes, the youngest child of Grace and Lewis Hughes was born April 12, 1929. She died May 24, 2001 of diabetes and congestive heart failure.

I had just turned ten years old when my mother, Grace Wilson Hughes, died at the age of 42 in 1932. Mostly, I remember that she worked long hard hours. There were three children younger than me and I are sure we kept her busy, along with all of the other chores she had to take care of. We raised lots of cattle, hogs, and chickens. There were always lots of cows to milk and pigs and chickens to feed. My older sister, Geneva, helped with the cooking cleaning while the rest of us girls did the milking, feeding the chickens and pigs, etc.

My two older brothers were always busy with the farming. We had over 500 acres of wheat, as well as corn, oats, barley, and hay. Binders were used to cut the wheat and bind it into bundles, which had to be shocked so the grain would dry for threshing. When the shocking was done, it was the job of us girls to keep drinking water carried to the field for the workers. As soon as the grain was dry, threshing crews from all of our neighbors came to help with the threshing.

It was exciting to watch the arrival of all of the neighbors with their teams and hayracks. We had the only threshing machine in the area. When threshing was finished at our place, the machine was moved to a neighbor's place until everyone's threshing was done. We were always as happy to see them leave as we were to see them arrive. Preparing meals for 25-30 threshers created much work for the "cooks".

All of the farming was done with mule teams to pull the machines. Just taking care of the animals was a lot of work for my brothers.

We always raised meat of our own food. We had an orchard, which provided plenty of fruit to be canned - apples, cherries, and I think, pears and apricots. We also had a very large garden providing vegetables- potatoes, green beans, peas, beets, carrots, lettuce, radishes, onions, etc. I have a very vivid memory of picking potato bugs off the potato plants on a regular basis.

Dad and my brothers butchered cattle and pigs to provide meat for the family. They cured ham and made sausage. We rendered the lard and made pickled pig's feet. We also churned our own butter and made cottage cheese. A cream separator stood in the corner of our kitchen. Any cream that was not used at home was sold to a creamery in Waldron, Kansas.

Early each spring Dad always bought 500 baby chicks to raise. We had a big brooder in the chicken house to keep them warm. Keeping them fed and watered was quite a task. As soon as the chickens were large enough, we had fried chicken almost every day. I'm surprised that chicken is still one of my favorite foods. When the chickens get larger, we would kill and dress 50 each Saturday to take to food locker cold storage plant in Anthony. We didn't have any thing to freeze them at home.

We always had about 500 head of beef cattle also. The pasture on our place was a mile wide and had a creek that ran through it. During harvest, one of jobs for us girls was to walk through the pasture to bring in the milk cows in the evenings, at least during the summer.

In the fall and winter, all of the cattle, except the milk cows, were turned onto the wheat pasture. Sometimes severe blizzards made it necessary for my brothers to round up the cattle and bring them in to the feed lots land back to the pastures. I always worried about them out in the extreme cold, driving the cattle in the storm. Sometimes the snow was so thick I could hardly see them when they came through the yard on the way to the barn and back to the pasture.

I think I was between fourth grade and fifth grade when Mother died. I remember the despair that seemed to envelope my father. I'm sure the reality of having a family of seven children to raise alone, five of them girls, was almost more than he could comprehend. He had the added burden of being diabetic when not much was known about dealing with diabetes.

I have always been grateful that Dad kept us all together. He firmly believed that a busy child couldn't get into too much trouble, and he certainly kept us busy!! We learned at an early age that getting our work done quickly and well done was the way to have time for more fun.

Fun when I was a kid didn't mean watching your favorite TV show or going to the movie, etc. Mostly we made our own fun. I remember swinging in a homemade swing hung from the limb of a very tall cottonwood tree. We would compete th see who could swing the highest.

A really fun place was the hayloft. There was a ladder reaching high into the top of the barn used to reach the hay fork that lifted the hay up and dumped it. We girls would climb part way up the ladder and jump off into the hay. There we re holes cut in the floor along the edge of the loft so hay could be put down into the stalls below for the animals. I remember falling down through one of those holes into the manger below. I don't know what kept me from breaking my neck. I was a bit more careful after that.

We had several old binders sitting around in the yard out near the barn. Us girls each picked a binder and would hang upside down on the reel and play our "who can hang the longest" game. We had a playhouse between one of the binders land a tree. We would hunt hen's nests that were hidden out and use the eggs to make mud pies. No one ever knew because they didn't know the eggs were there!!

We used binder twine or bailing wire and tin cans to made stilts. It was fun to run races on our stilts, but we had lots of skinned arms and knees.

One of my favorite games was running races on the board fences around the feed lots. The fences were high enough so a horse couldn't jump over them and only two inches wide. We would climb up on the fence in our bare feet and try to run the full length of the fence without falling off. It's a good way to improve your balance! Also, a good way to break something!!

Life was simple in those days and much less stressful than kids have it these days. There was always so much work to do on the farm that no one had the time to check to see what we were doing all of the time, as long as the things got done that we were supposed to get done. I've always been a pretty independent thinker and I am sure that a great deal of that is due to the fact that I had to assume responsibility for my part of the work at a very young age.





# Obituary... Dean Hughes 1913-1986 Farmer, Rancher Telephone Pioneer

an Wesley Hughes, son of Lewis Nelson Hughes and Grace Mariah Wilson Hughes, was born November 30, 1913, on a farm near Waldron, Kansas. He died on October 2, 1986, in Anthony, Kansas at the age of 72. He was preceded in death by his parents, his sister Fern, and a grandson, Todd Warbinton.

Dean grew up on the family farm near Waldron and attended Eagle Grade School. During his high school years, he was an avid participant in basketball and track, reaching state competition in track. He graduated from Anthony High School in 1932.

On Feb. 21, 1937, Dean married his high school sweetheart, Vivian Campbell. They are the parents of five children, Bonnie, Sherri, Vickie, Wesley and Rodney. He worshipped with his family at the Christian Church in Waldron and later in Anthony.

Dean, in partnership with his brother Dale. began farming in 1935 as "Hughes Brothers" by renting farm ground in the Waldron, Kansas area. By 1938 they were able to purchase their own farm. They entered the registered Holstein business in 1942 and "Sandyland Holstein Dairy Cattle" were sold from Canada to Peru. Although they sold their dairy herd in 1963, the farm and ranch operation continued to be a large one which beef cattle, wheat and pasture. in De nd Vivian lived on their farm near Waldron until May, 1960, when they moved to their new home in Anthony.

In the early 50's Dean worked with dedication and determination laying the ground work for the organization of the rural telephone system known now as KanOkla Telephone Company. He served as president from 1951 to 1971 and was on the Board of Directors from its inception to his death. In 1985 he received an award at the National Telephone Cooperative Association for 35 years of dedicated service in the telephone industry.

Dean was an active and interested community member. He served on the school board for Eagle School District for twelve years, and as a community 4-H leader.

He was a creative person who was always searching for new ideas, with a knack for conversation. He was a loving family man; his family and seven grandchildren were the most important part of his life. Because he believed in progress and in planning for life, he saw to it that each of his children received a college education. He truly believed that "a man cannot leave a better legacy to the world than a well-educated family."

# Phones, Farming His Life

Morris E. Redfern of Anthony was instrumental in bringing modern, dependable telephone service to about 2,400 subscribers on both sides of the Kansas-Oklahoma line. And that's not all he did

Redfern also was a vice president and director of the First National Bank in Anthony and a farmer and rancher in Harper and adjoining counties. He died Thursday at age 55.

Although Southwestern Bell serves Anthony, and other nearby cities, telephone service to most area farms, including Redfern's, was of the "crank and holler" variety until the 1950s, said Loren Petersen; general manager of the KanOkla Telephone Associations

Bedierr "played an important part" in organizing KanOkla, serving as secretary-treasurer from 1954 until last month, Peterson said.
