

<u>Delmer Loyd Wilson and Ina Edith Merritt</u> History is written by the children as told by Dad and Mom

The twins - Delmer Loyd Wilson and Elmer Floyd Wilson were born on June 17, 1906, on a farm north of Almena, KS. Elmer and Eva moved to Harper County at Waldron where Elmer had a farm and owned a machinery company. They lived near a creek. In the winter, when the creek was frozen over, they would make ice skates out of wood to skate on the ice. Delmer said that once while skating, he caught his skate on a tree root sticking through the ice and took a tumble, badly spraining his ankle. Elmer sold the machinery shop and moved by covered wagon to Gove County on a farm west of Jerome in 1920. The children went to Jerome Grade School. Delmer graduated from the 8th grade but his twin Elmer, had contracted polio and missed so much school, that he graduated a year later. One of their classmates was Hazel Bentley (Mrs. Fred Priefert), Fred S. Baker (a 1920 Gove High School graduate) was Elmer's 8th grade teacher. In 1926 Delmer worked on a farm south of Dighton in the summer and went to Perryton, Texas with a friend to work in the oil fields. Came back to Goodland and worked for the John Deere agency. They bought a farm north of Goodland with Elmer Kirkendall with a sod house on it. We lived in one half and Kirkendall's lived in the other half. We had a cook shack where we cooked and ate in good weather.

Delmer and Elmer drove a semi gas truck for Kippes from McPherson to Goodland. Dad told of working with a threshing crew with a big, black fellow that would make Dad get in the shade and rest, because it was so hot. I believe that took place in the Goodland area, possibly before he was married.

Ina Merritt was born on October 21, 1907 to E.J. and Minnie Merritt, the oldest child in her family, in Decatur County, KS. She went to grade school her first and second years at St. Francis (Cheyenne County).

A story Mom told of her childhood was that at a family gathering one of her cousins got angry about something and poured their cup of cocoa into the water well and was therefore punished.

Her family moved to Goodland, KS and they lived in the southwest part of town or south west of town. She attended school through 9th grade there. She said she and her friends would take turns going to church with each other, I presume at different churches.

Her 10th (sophomore) year was spent at Cumberland, IA (Cass County) as she was taking care of an ill aunt while also going to school. While in Iowa, she was baptized at a Church of God. She told of changing into baptismal robes for baptism by immersion and when she returned for her dress to change back, someone had taken her dress, either accidentally or on purpose, she never knew. She returned to Goodland to finish her schooling, graduating with her class in May 1927.

Mom taught at a country school south of Bird City, but couldn't remember the name of the school. She did say, though, that one of the families she taught had the last name of Angel and they were anything but!

Delmer and Ina were married in Burlington, CO on May 28, 1928. They started their married life on a farm near Goodland, KS. While in Goodland, the following children were born: Ina Mae (died right after birth), Lawrence, Loyd and Eva. Ina went to Cumberland, Iowa to have Lawrence, with Minnie and Mattie as midwives. While living in Sherman County, Dad played baseball on a team called the Country Line Team. They were a good team having beaten the Colorado State Champion team.

Delmer and Ina then moved to Gove County on a farm in Jerome Township, south of the Smoky Hill River in 1934, which is the Willard Davis place. During the dust storms, windows and screens were covered with cardboard or wet sheets to keep out the dust. Dad hunted coyotes on horseback. He said the best time to hunt coyote on horseback was in the winter time, below freezing, Dad would drive the coyote across a stream and then stay back to let the water freeze on their tails. The coyote couldn't run fast because the frozen tail slowed him down and sometimes the tail would knock his feet out from under him and he would roll.

They owned a few head of cattle which were for milking. This gave us fresh milk, butter and cottage cheese. The calves were sold or raised for replacement heifers or meat. The meat was preserved by "curing" or in cold winter by hanging it on a hook. Chickens were also raised for eggs and meat. Eggs were hatched under setting hens every year. We got food commodities once a month for at least a year.

During the early years Dad was not home much as he left for work early and came home late. In the winter, Dad trapped to supplement the income. He ran trap lines for skunks, raccoons, coyotes and badgers. One time Loyd followed Dad and tried to set off a trap, but Loyd got his finger in the trap instead.

Family recreation activities were few and consisted of fishing, swimming and picnicking.

Lawrence, Loyd and Eva went to the Dalton Valley School and their teacher was Mrs. Deb (Mildred) Johnson, 1938. During the late 30's very few crops were raised and those were poor. Dad worked for the WPA when work was available. We put up haystacks of russian thistle for cattle feed.

Jack Rabbits were plentiful and young jack rabbits and cottontails were hunted for food by Dad with his .22 rifle. Young pigeons were occasionally eaten after being caught in the barn.

A cooler for preserving perishable foods (milk, butter, cheese) was used. It was made out of a wooden barrel of water with a floating platform at the windmill, which pumped water through the barrel.

In the places where the folks lived, there was no running water, electricity or telephones, until much later. Water was carried from the windmill or the spring. Light was from a kerosene lamp, which was used sparingly.

Dad and Mom would both drive the Model T. To start the car you had to crank it. One day Mom was starting the car and while cranking the car, it backfired and the crank handle hit her arm, badly bruising it. Mom wouldn't drive the car after that.

One winter morning when Dad went out to milk, he slipped on the icy porch and fell on the steps injuring his back. From that time on, he wore an eight inch wide belt for back support (1937 or 38).

In 1938 Dad lost the lease on the farm and he went to work for Fritz Bentley. We moved, by pickup, into a house about 3/4 mile west of highway 23 on Cheyenne Creek. This house was built into the side of the hill. This was west and a little south of Earl Wilson's farm (Dean Wilson now).

Deloris remembers that the creek was up and Dad had been to town for groceries and had to leave the car on the other side of the creek. He had one of those oval wooden baskets with a wooden handle and it was full of grapes, with the groceries.

Also, while living on Cheyenne Creek, Deloris remembers going with Dad to get water at Fullmer's a ½ mile south. Dad drove horses that pulled a sled with water barrels on it and thought they had to use buckets to fill the barrels.

There were good hay bottoms along the creek which were mowed, raked and stacked with a horse powered buck rake.

On Cheyenne Creek we had a large garden watered by the windmill. Dad drove the car to work so we were stuck at home without transportation. In 1939, Delmer and Ina with the first six kids visited Ed and Minnie on the farm south of Cumberland. The older kids helped Grandpa hoe corn, stacked either Barley or Oats, put up clover hay, cleaned corn cobs out of pig pens and dug potatoes. Grandpa had a team of horses. One horse got stuck in a hog hole and could not get out. He took the horse from the barn and pulled the downed horse out with it. Lawrence got sick eating green apples from the orchard, because Dorothy talked him into eating them.

Our place was taken over by the military for the aerial gunnery range for WWII, so we had to move the summer of 1943. During WWII, families received food and sugar rationing stamps. We managed to have extra sugar stamps which were traded to other families.

Dad moved the family to a house 1½ miles east of highway 23 and 1/4 south of the road. At this new location we built a barn by digging into a side hill below the house. Lawrence and Loyd did most of the work. We roofed the barn by using a cottonwood tree for the ridge pole. This barn was warm in the winter and cool in the summer. Mom canned a lot of garden produce and fruit. We loved the lamb's quarter she canned. It grew wild and tasted a lot like spinach.

Cooking and heating was by a wood or coal burning stove, called a "Home Comfort Range". This stove also had a tank on the side for heating water for baths and washing water. Baths were in a metal tub. Eva was playing around the stove and caught her elbow between the guard rails on the front end and badly burned her elbow.

Jerome School had to close because of the gunnery range. The school was moved to the basement of Uncle Earl's house, where school was held from the fall of 1942 through spring of 1946. Earl was the teacher from 1942 through 1944. Consuella (Connie) was the teacher in 1944-45 and Earl taught in 1945-46.

Dad told Candy that at one time Mom had been very ill with a very high fever. They weren't sure that Mom would live, but she recovered, although, according to Dad, she lost her memory of about the previous two years. Perhaps that is why she was mixed up about Calvin's birthdate. In talking to Delila Speer on March 14, 1998, Delila said she could remember her folks going over every day to check on Mom when she was ill.

One day while the kids were at school and Dad at work, Calvin decided to smoke a raccoon from under the house. The house burned to the ground, but Mom did save the trunk of keepsakes and some kerosene lamps and a couple chairs. There were 35 mile per hour winds that day. Calvin ran to highway 23 and was picked up and taken back to the house.

The family moved to a house one mile south of the Davis place (the Lang house), where we lived until we moved into the Fritz Bentley home place. Bentley sold to Roscoe Coberly in 1946 and Dad didn't know that Bentley had sold until Roscoe Coberly came to Dad and said that he was working for him now.

At the Lang house, south of Willard Davis, we went to the Jerome School in Uncle Earl's home. The first day of school, Dad went to the top of the hill and waved his cap so we could see where to go when we walked home through the pasture. Eva said we were way off from where we should have been, but Dad guided us home by waving the cap at us.

After moving to the Fritz Bentley place the children returned to school at Dalton Valley in the fall of 1946 where Loyd graduated from the 8th grade in the spring of 1947. Mrs. Miller was the teacher. The Jerome school was moved up on Highway 23 after this time and school resumed there in 1947.

The Bentley place was the first house Mom and Dad lived in that had running water. This was done by gravity flow through a shallow concrete tank in the house, and this tank was also used for keeping milk and food cool. Water also flowed to a stock tank at the barn. The house had electricity, first by wind charger and batteries, then by REA and a telephone that was a party line which meant that anyone could listen in on your conversation. The phone number was 3 long and a short ring.

This house also burned. Mom said it started in the attic from an electrical short, but some say the twins started it by playing with matches. The house was two houses put together. Mom saved the trunk again We lived in the garage that was built into the side of the hill until the new house was moved in (a schoolhouse). It had a pressure water system.

We were about 1/4 mile from the Smokey Hill River and sometimes it would flood and the water would come up the creek and into the barn. The barn burned down on the 4th of July weekend (Sunday) 1962. It was over 100 degrees that day and Mom smelled smoke and ran out of the house. Smoke came through the swamp cooler. The barn was engulfed in flames and Dad ran down to the chicken house and got the pickup out. Nothing you could do except watch it burn. Dad said it was started by sun coming through a piece of glass.

We remember Dad as he would repair machinery or vehicles, fix fence, work with cattle, drive tractor, replace window glass, go to ball games (basketball or baseball), and also go roller-skating. Some of Dad's favorite foods were biscuits and gravy, pecan pie and ripe and ragged peaches.

Dad had a problem with flat feet and always wore arch supports in his shoes. These were made of leather with a metal support inside. I don't know if standing while driving tractor was part of the problem. The metal tractor seats couldn't have been too comfortable after a few hours (that was before they invented tractor cabs and padded tractor seats).

Mom was capable, intelligent and talented. I'm sure that being the oldest in her family that she had a lot of responsibility. She gardened and loved flowers. Her sewing skills included crocheting, embroidering and much mending. Mom loved reading and enjoyed Capper's Weekly and later The Wichita Beacon. She loved photographs and is always willing to have her picture taken.

Dad was helping to take a gear head down from a wind charger when one of the ropes gave way. Dad had hold of another rope to guide the gear head down and when the other rope came loose, it threw him. He was shaken up, but not hurt.

Dad always enjoyed family reunions, whether with his brothers and sisters or with his children's families. We remember going to Uncle Earl's and having homemade ice cream. Dad would go up to visit Mom's family in Cumberland almost every summer.

The doctors in Quinter thought Dad might have TB so he was sent to the sanatorium in Norton to have tests and had annual follow-up visits for a few years. It was always negative. He stayed with Don and Mildred Wilson in Almena.

Dad would stand on his head to entertain the grandkids. He taught Brian to say the alphabet backwards and Brian taught it to Heidi. One of Dad's sayings was that if you were going to get yourself in trouble, you would have to figure out a way to get yourself out of trouble.

Dad worked for Roscoe Coberly until his death. He was the foreman in charge of the farming operations and he worked for Roscoe for 25 years. Each of Dad's boys, when they got old enough, worked for Roscoe, too, often in the same field with Dad, at least in the beginning. Dad had his first heart attack in the summer of 1966. He had several over the next four years. Dad passed away September 22, 1970.

We moved Mom to Gove after the winter, as Roscoe said she could stay on the farm long as she wanted to. We bought a house in Gove. The bathroom was upstairs and one day mom fell down part of the stairs. Jeanne lived next door with her two boys. She had a two bedroom house with one step into the porch and a small step into the house. She needed more room so the family agreed for them to switch houses. Mom enjoyed that new house. We remodeled Mom's old house before Jeanne and the boys moved in.

The Family celebrated Mom 90th Birthday on October 18th, 1997. Saturday we had a dinner at Wayne & Deloris Packard place out on the farm. Two of Mom's sisters came down from Cumberland, Iowa (Larie Erickson, Alberta Erickson). Had a great time of visiting and remembering old times. On Sunday we celebrated Mom's 90th birthday with cake & ice-cream at the Senior Center in Gove.







Delmer Wilson, son of Elmer and Eva Wilson was born June 17, 1906 near Almena, Norton County, Ks., and died Sept. 22, 1970 at the Gove County Hospital, Quinter, Ks., at the age of 64.

On May 28, 1928 he married Ina Merritt of Goodland. To this union ten children were born. Surviving are his wife, Ina, six sons, Lawrence, Loyd, Delmer, Jr., Calvin, Floyd and Boyd and four daughters, Mrs. LeRoy (Eva) Flowers; Mrs. Packard; Wayne (Deloris) (Carmellia) Wildeman, Leonard Mrs. Daryl (Trisha) Groom. also leaves to mourn 28 grandchildren, one brother, Roy Wilson of Goodland and one sister, Mrs Tom (Elizabeth) Baldwin of Nekoma, and many other relatives.

GOVE - Ina E. Wilson, 91, Gove, died Sunday, Sept. 26, 1999, at Gove County Medical Center Long Term Care, Quinter.

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Mrs. Wilson was born Ina Merritt on Oct. 21, 1907, in Decatur County and was a Gove County resident since 1935, moving from Goodland. She was a homemaker and taught in a rural school south of Bird City.


